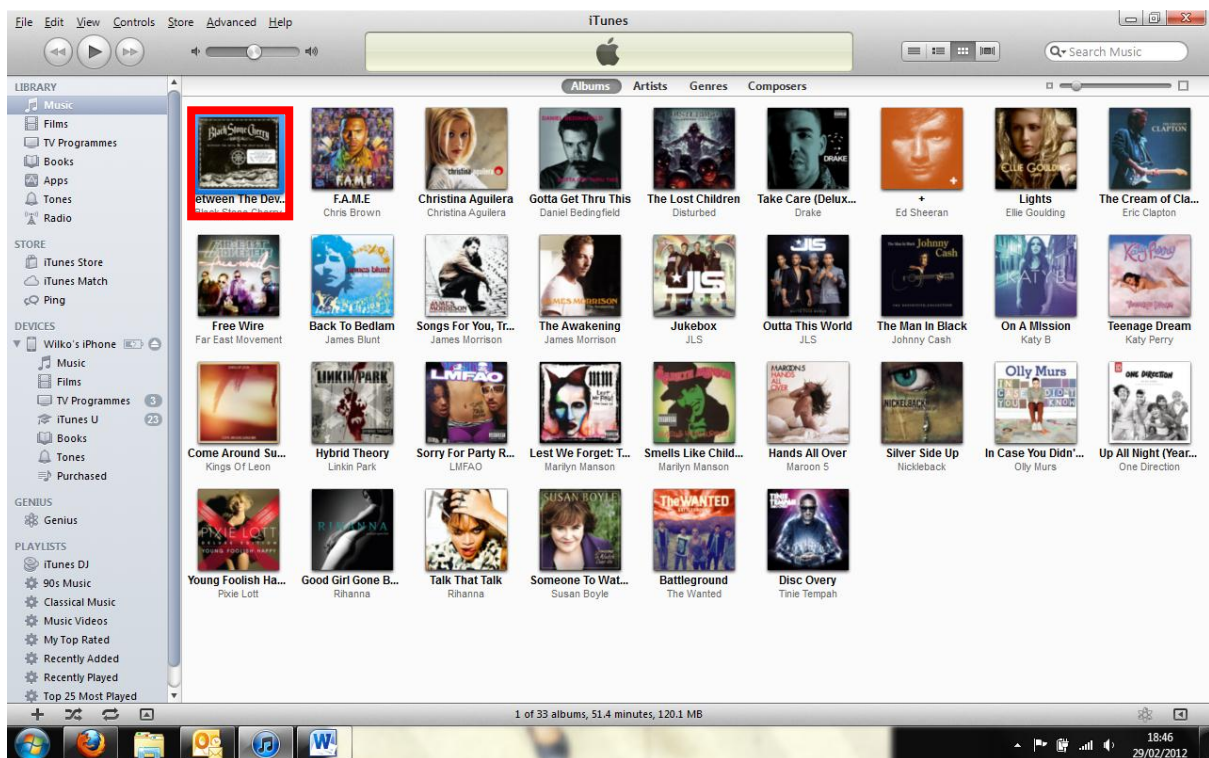


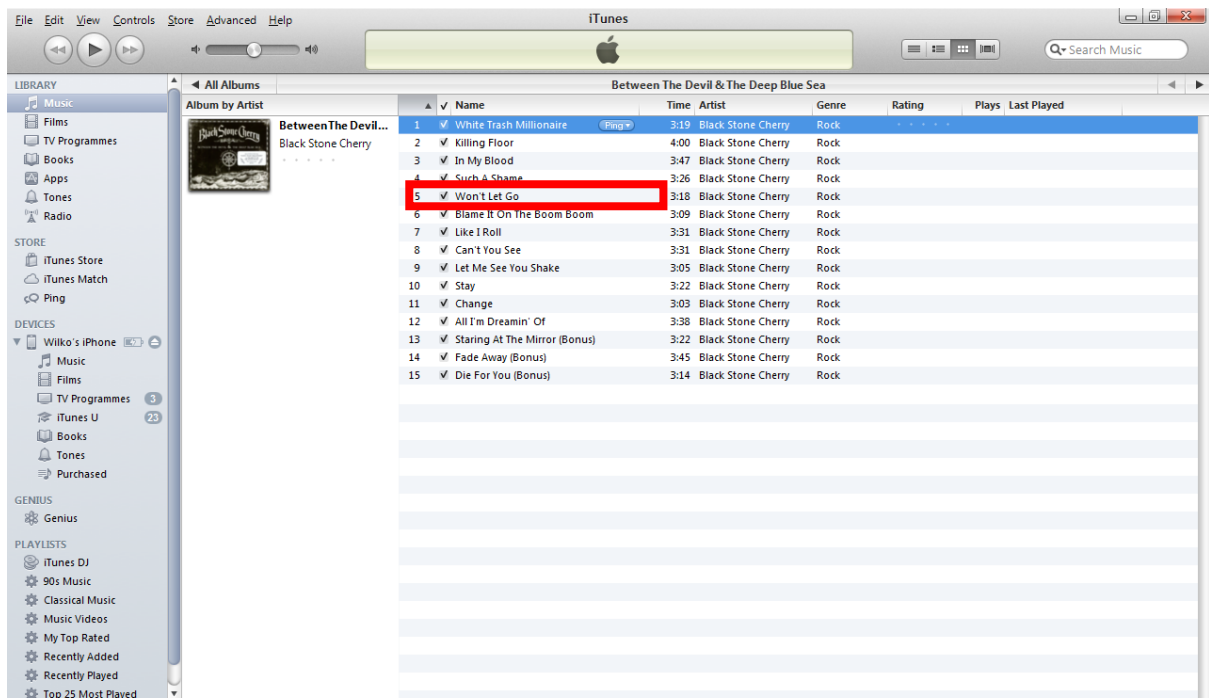
Make a Ringtone for iPhone

This tutorial will give you a step by step guide to creating a ringtone for your iPhone.

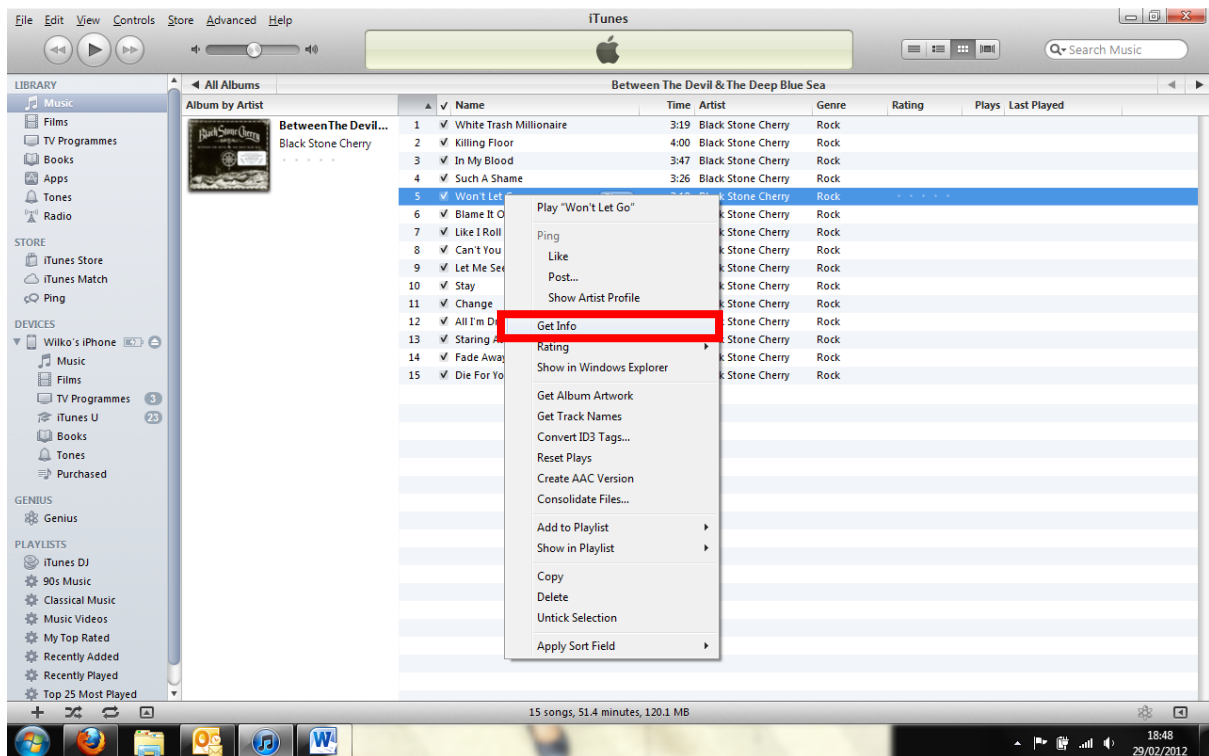
Firstly select the album you want to 'grab' the song from for your iPhone.



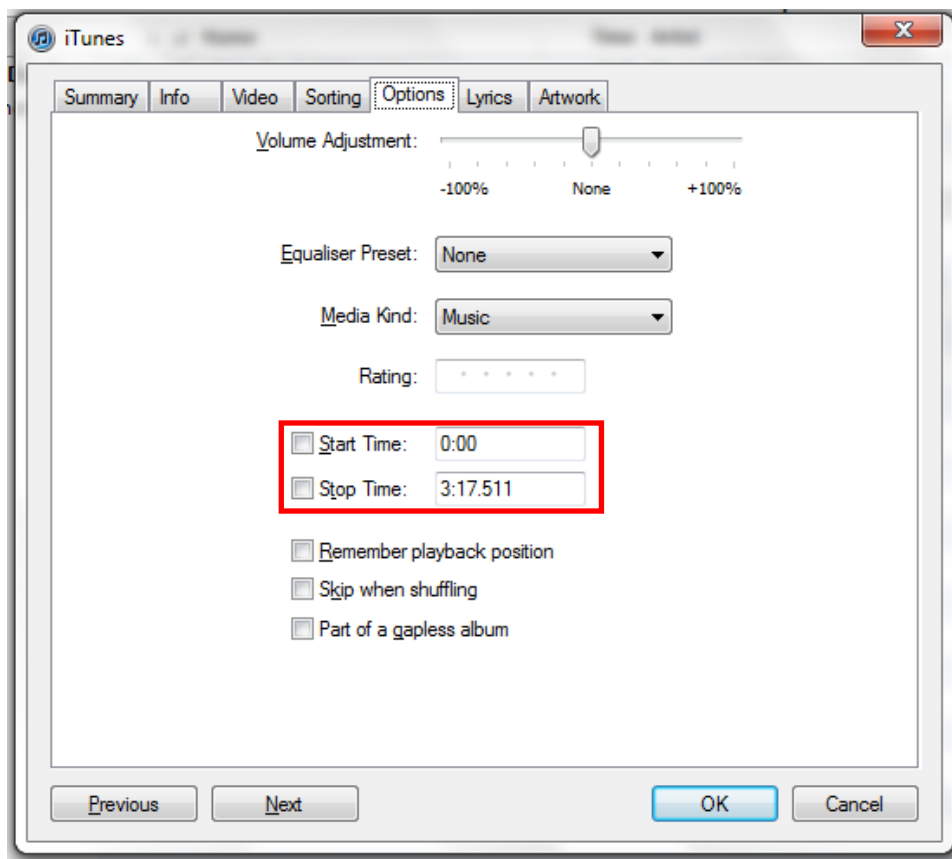
Next, double click the album you want so that it brings up this screen;



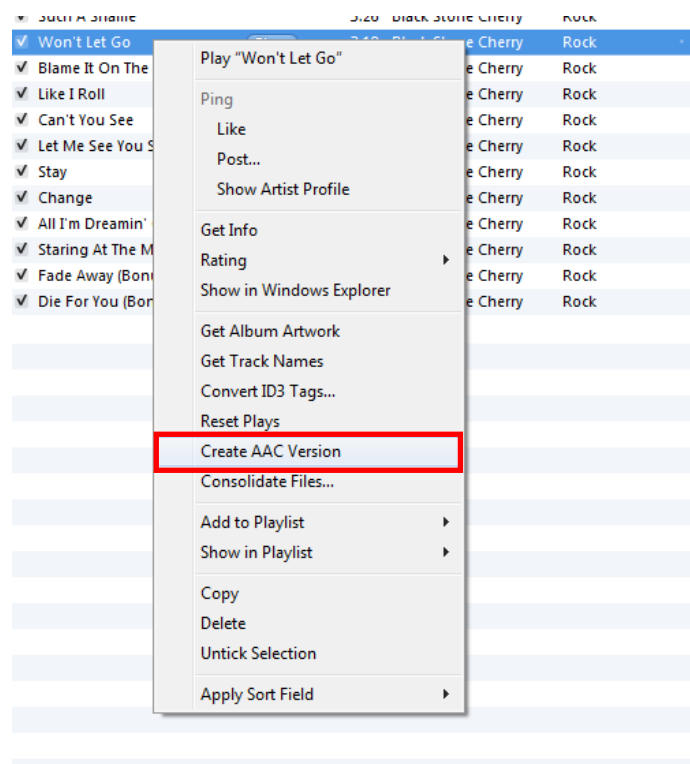
Then, right click the track you want and choose 'Get info'



Then you want to go to the 'Options' tab and select the 'Start time' and 'End time' of the song (this will be the start and end of your ringtone, you may want to choose the chorus so find where it first starts and ends) – Be sure to check the boxes next to the times. Then click OK



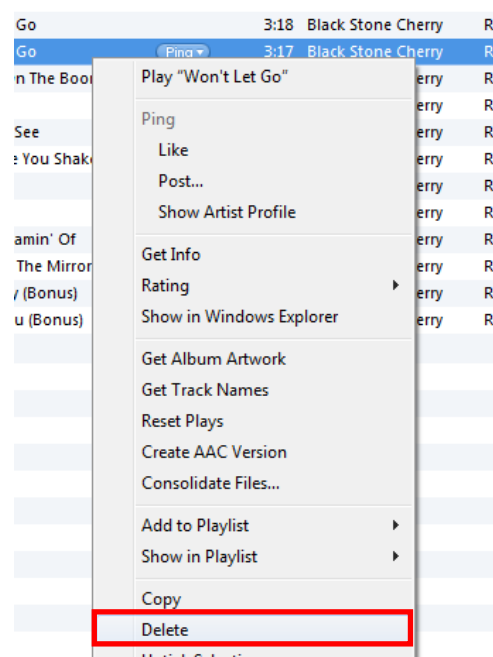
Now you need to right click the song again and this time choose 'Create AAC Version'



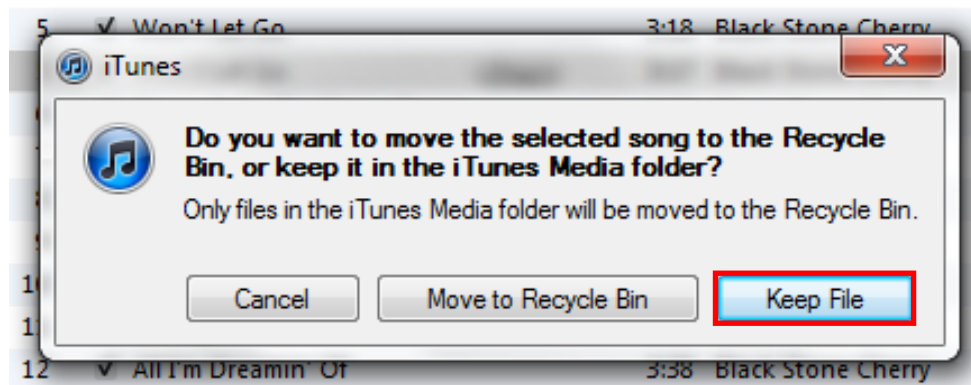
It will appear below the original

Right click the 'AAC Version' and choose delete

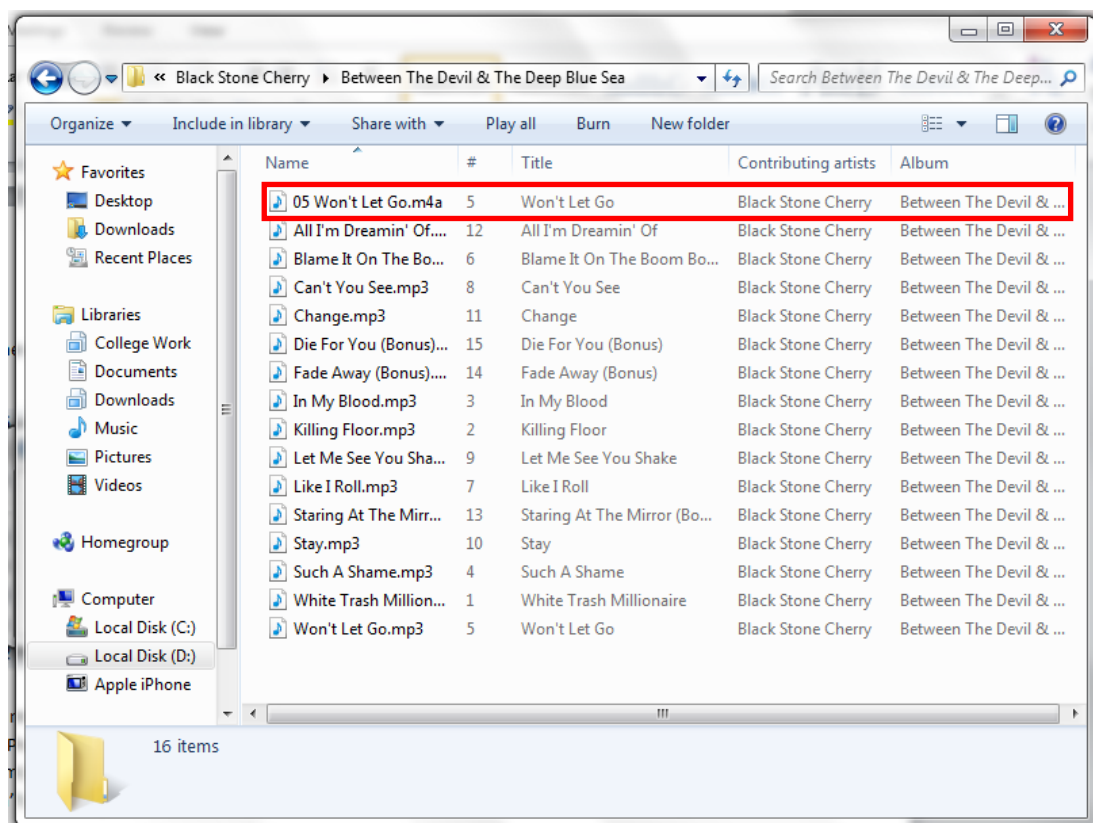


On the warning screen that pops up you need to choose 'Keep file'

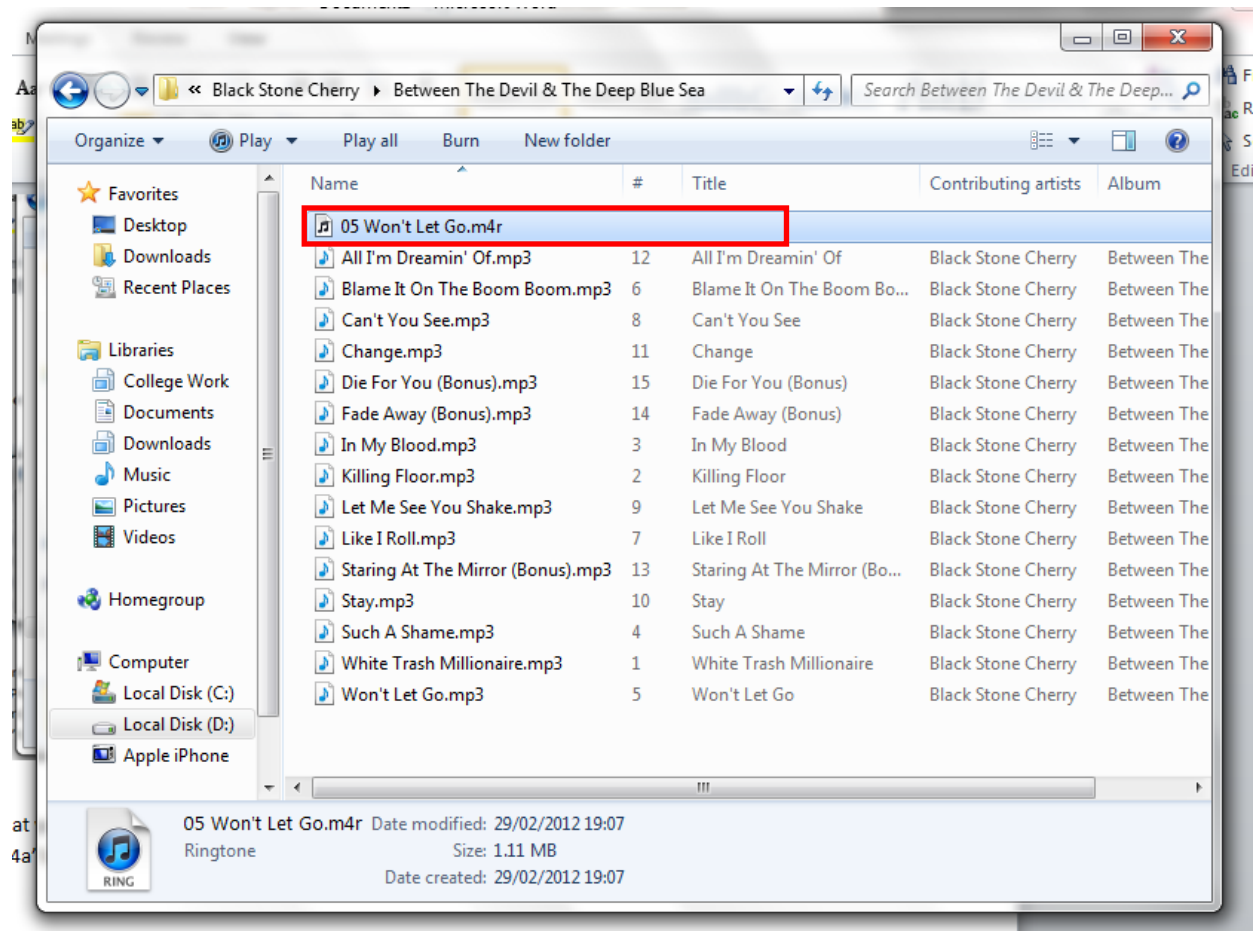


Then minimise the iTunes window and navigate to your iTunes music folder (The Edit>Preferences>Advanced will show you where this is), you will then need to find the Artist and Album (if you have them stored like that in your iTunes). For this example I converted a song called 'Won't Let Go' by Blackstone Cherry, the album was called 'Between the Devil & the Deep Blue Sea'.

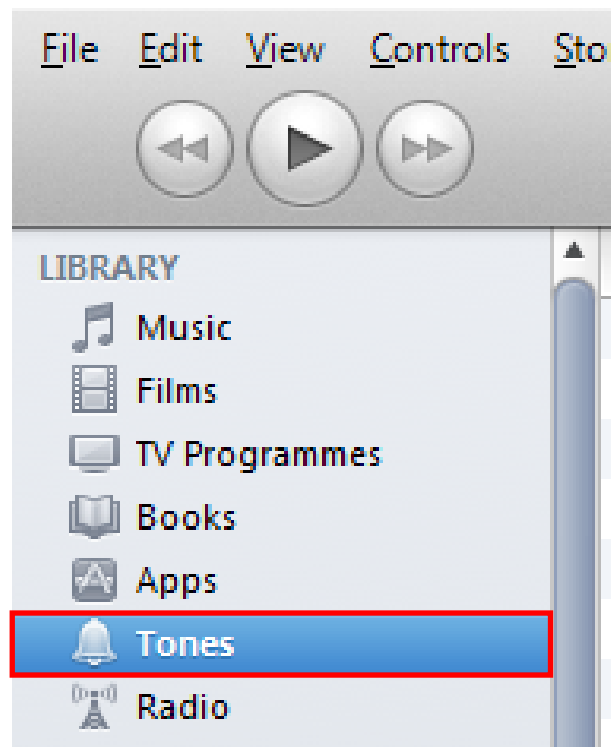
As you can see in the screenshot below the track I Want is the top one (the one with '.m4a' at the end)



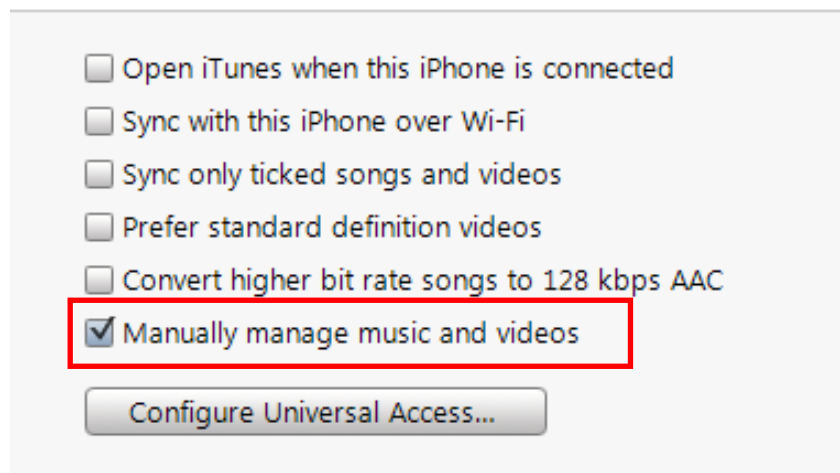
What you need to do next is right click that file and choose 'Rename'. You only need to change the '.m4a' bit. You will change it to '.m4r'. The icon will change to that of an iTunes file



Then simply double click the file and it will add it to the 'Tones' section of your iTunes library (If you didn't already have any tones it will create one for you)



It will start playing so you can just press the stop button in the controls. All you need to do is just drag it over to your iPhone (make sure you have 'Manually manage music and videos' checked) so that you can do the drag-drop bit
